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1. Introduction

Human Overpopulation

- "a condition of being populated with excessively large numbers of people"
- "an excessive number of people straining available resources and facilities"
- Politically incorrect and controversial topic, thus widely ignored
- BUT we need to talk about overpopulation

3. Results – Human Numbers

■ The world's population

- is currently 7.7 billion people (mid-2019)
- grows by over 80 million people a year
- will keep growing, reaching 9.7 billion (2050) and 11 billion (2100)

■ Population growth will be most dramatic in (sub-Saharan) Africa

- more than 50% of anticipated growth up to 2050
- the only contributor to global population growth after 2050
- Africa's share of global population: 19% (2019) ... 26% (2050) ... 40% (2100)

3. Results of Overpopulation

- Environmental (climate change, biodiversity loss, mass species extinction, deforestation, desertification, resource depletion, environmental pollution, increase in municipal waste)
- **Healthcare** (lack of fresh water, starvation and malnutrition, poor hygiene and living conditions, increased chance of **new epidemics and pandemics**, low life expectancy)
- **Political and Economic** (inadequate healthcare, education, and employment, radicalization and extremism, **resource-driven wars**, slowing economic growth, **an obstacle to SDGs**)
- Social (increased poverty, crime rates, conflicts and wars, forced migration)

3. Results – Unintended Pregnancies

Global epidemic

- 41% of all pregnancies are unintended (86 million of 208 million pregnancies a year)
- Major effect on women's and societal health

Consequences

- Health (induced abortions, maternal and infant morbidity and mortality)
- Psychological (depression, suicidal behavior)
- Social (abandoning newborns, inadequate upbringing)

3. Results – Family Planning

- Unintended pregnancies and their consequences are largely preventable if
 - Women are well informed about family planning methods and services
 - Women are well educated in sexual and reproductive health
 - Women have access to contraception and family planning services
- Availability of family planning methods does not meet current global needs
 - 214 million women in developing countries have no access to modern contraception
 - Contraceptive use is deficient in sub-Saharan Africa (global use of 28% versus 57%)

4. Conclusion

- Human overpopulation represents a grave threat to both humanity and the planet Earth
- The most humane solution lies in support of human rights, girls' and women's education and empowerment, and availability of family planning methods and services
- The solution overlaps with solutions to purely gynecological problems mentioned before
- As such, human overpopulation (and rapid population growth) should become **the greatest challenge for gynecology** of the 21st century
- A direct, systematic and global involvement of gynecologists and their organizations will be necessary, with particular focus on Africa, where the problems will be most severe
